
the outskirts of hope



In 1967 when Jo was 10 years old, her father moved their family to an all-black town in the Mississippi Delta, where they were one of only two white families and the only Jewish one. There, her father started a medical clinic, her mother taught at the local high school, and Jo was the only white student at her junior high. Living in a trailer in the poorest county in the nation during the turbulent 1960s, they were drawn into the heart of the civil rights movement.

WHY INCLUDE OUTSKIRTS IN YOUR CURRICULUM?

Middle and high schoolers learning about the Civil Rights Movement will get a unique, personal perspective unlike textbook retellings. *Outskirts* can be used as a companion book to or in place of Harper Lee's *To Kill a Mockingbird*, providing the opportunity to address the same issues of racial discrimination, the Jim Crow laws, life in the Deep South during segregation, but with a true story.

The reading of *The Outskirts of Hope* provides a Common Core-aligned curriculum through its focus on reading, writing, speaking, and listening. It can be presented as a one-hour assembly or classroom presentation, or read over the course of a couple of weeks. *Outskirts* is a critically acclaimed, best-selling memoir, having appeared in the *Wall Street Journal*'s top ten list of non-fiction e-books. It won the 2015 National Indie Excellence Award for Autobiography and the Writers' League of Texas Best Non-fiction for 2015.
