


JO IVESTER BEST-SELLING, AWARD-WINNING AUTHOR



Bio

Jo Ivester is an LGBTQ and civil rights advocate, sharing her family's story as a way of helping others to step beyond their comfort zones when it comes to relating to those who are different from themselves. Raised in a politically active family, Jo spent two years of her childhood living in an all-Black town in the Mississippi Delta, where her father managed a medical clinic, her mother taught in the local high school, and she was the only white student at her junior high. This experience, captured in Jo's first book — the best-selling, award-winning memoir *The Outskirts of Hope* — led to Jo's lifelong commitment to advocating for equal rights for all.

Prompted by the realization that her son is trans, Jo has recently broadened her focus to raise awareness about what it means to be transgender.

Her second book — the best-selling, award-winning memoir *Never Once* a *Girl, Always a Boy* — presents Jeremy's journey, told from multiple perspectives, beginning when he was a small child, viewed as a tomboy. Jo is currently adapting *Always a Boy* for the stage.

When not writing, Jo devotes time to her community, serving on the boards of PFLAG Georgetown Equality Texas, the Anti-Defamation League of Central Texas, and the Ground Floor Theater. Even more time is devoted to her growing family, with four grown children and five grandchildren, and a wonderful husband, Jon, to whom she's been married for 41 years. She attended classes at Reed College as a physics major, completed undergraduate work in civil engineering and urban planning at MIT, earned an MBA from Stanford, and now lives in Georgetown, Texas.



never a girl, always a boy

Jeremy Ivester is a transgender man. More than thirty years ago, his parents welcomed him into the world as what they thought was their daughter. As a child, he preferred the toys and games our society views as masculine. He kept his hair short and wore boys' clothing. They called him a tomboy. That's what he called himself.

By high school, when he showed no interest in flirting, his parents thought he might be lesbian. At twenty, he wondered if he was asexual. At twenty-three, he had top surgery to remove breast tissue. A year later, he began taking the hormones that would lower his voice and give him a beard—and he announced his new name and pronouns.

Never Once a Girl, Always a Boy is Jeremy's journey from childhood through coming out as transgender and eventually emerging as an advocate for the transgender community. This is not only Jeremy's story but also that of his family, told from multiple perspectives—those of the siblings who struggled to understand the brother they once saw as a sister, and of the parents who ultimately joined him in the battle against discrimination. This is a story of acceptance in a world not quite ready to accept.



In 1967, when Jo Ivester was ten years old, her father moved his young family from a suburb of Boston to an all-Black town in the heart of the Mississippi cotton fields, where he became the medical director of a clinic that served the poor population for miles around. Jo's mother taught at the local high school and Jo was the only white student at her junior high.

In *The Outskirts of Hope*, Ivester uses journals left by her mother, as well as writings of her own, to paint a vivid, moving, and inspiring portrait of her family's experiences living and working in an all-Black town during the height of the civil rights movement.

Jo Ivester addresses a wide range of audiences, from small book clubs to entire schools, sharing her personal stories about both her transgender son, Jeremy, and her own childhood experiences in the Mississippi Delta.

By making people more comfortable with those who are different from them, Jo equips her audiences with tools to consciously navigate help them navigate the world with acceptance in regard to race, religion, sexual orientation, and gender identification.





